REPORT OF THE HONORARY TREASURER TO THE 70th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOUTH AFRICAN ROAD FEDERATION, HELD VIRTUALLY, 26 NOVEMBER 2020

1. INTRODUCTION

It is with pleasure that this report is submitted to the SARF AGM 2020 for the reporting period 01 August 2019 to 31 July 2020. Included in the report is the proposed Annual Budget for 2020/2021 for consideration and approval by the AGM.

2. MANAGEMENT REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The monthly Financial Management Reports were reviewed by the Treasurer for variances from the budget of key items. The Treasurer has given feedback and made recommendations to Executive, Council and Head Office staff for the necessary actions where applicable.

A financial audit was undertaken by appointed auditors, Dalia Consulting, for the reporting period. Dalia has provided the report entitled "Annual Financial Statements for the year ended 31 July 2020. Dalia expressed the opinion that the Annual Financial Statements present fairly, and in all material respects, the financial position of the South African Road Federation, Not for Profit Company as of 31 July 2020.

3. OVERVIEW

With reference to the attached Annual Financial Statement, particularly page 8, the following overview is presented:

a) Revenue (courses, subscriptions, and other Income)

- i Course Revenue stands at R4 263 036, against the Revised Annual Budget of R4 500 000, is 95% achievement, considering the adverse times we have faced, this is a massive achievement by the team.
- ii Subscriptions were over collected the budgeted amount of R1 000 000 by 105%, and R 1 051 525 was collected.
- iii Other Income received is R 700 071.
- iv The Total Revenue achieved is R 6 310 120, which is 100% of the Revised Annual Budget of R6 300 000.

b) Core Business Operations /Cost of Sales (Including course costs)

The total Cost of Sales amounts to R2 236 705, including course costs. The total of cost of sales was below the Annual Budget of R2 535 000 at 88%, indicating the efforts of the SARF HO to keep the costs under control.

c) Operating/ Administration Expenses (Including Salaries and Wages)

The total Operating/Administration Expenses of R5 326 298, which is 99% of the Revised Annual Budget R5 337 990.

d) Total Expenditure (Core Business Operations` plus Operating Expense)

The Total Expenditure is R7 563 003 is at 96% of the Revised Annual Total Expenditure budget R7 872 990.

e) **Total Comprehensive Income (Total Revenue less Total Expenditure)**

The Total Comprehensive Deficit for the year amounts to R-1 252 883 which is considerably lower than the revised Annual Budget deficit of R-1 572 990.

4. CONCLUSIONS

- i The Total Revenue achieved at 100% of the Annual Budget is attributable to significant effort to exploit new courses and the new online platform, so to allow courses to be presented even during the lockdown.
- ii The Total Comprehensive Loss for the year amounts to R-1 252 883, lower in comparison to the Annual Budget of R-1 572 990.
- iii A glimmer of hope is reflected in the growth of our Reserves, from R 4 800 000 balance at 01 August 2019 to R 5 199 198 at 31 July 2020.
- iv Accordingly, based on the AFS as prepared by Dalia, 2019/2020 Financial reflects a loss, we are still a going concern and with plans to realise a better 2020/2021 Financial year.

6. PROPOSED ANNUAL BUDGET FOR 2020/2021

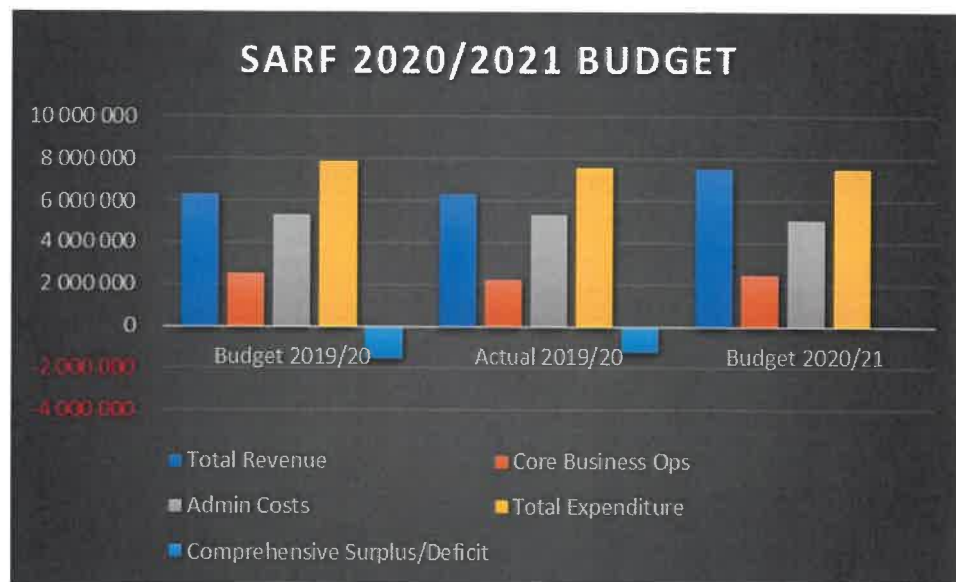



Accounting Policies

1. Presentation of Annual Financial Statements

The annual financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities, and the Companies Act 71 of 2008. The annual financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, and incorporate the principal accounting policies set out below. They are presented in South African Rands.

These accounting policies are consistent with the previous period.

1.1 Significant judgements and sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing the annual financial statements, management is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts represented in the annual financial statements and related disclosures. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results in the future could differ from these estimates which may be material to the annual financial statements.

1.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tangible items that:

- are held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, for rental to others or for administrative purposes; and
- are expected to be used during more than one period.

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Cost includes all costs incurred to bring the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Costs include costs incurred initially to acquire or construct an item of property, plant and equipment and costs incurred subsequently to add to, replace part of, or service it. If a replacement cost is recognised in the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method to write down the cost, less estimated residual value over the useful life of the property, plant and equipment, which is as follows:

The residual value, depreciation method and useful life of each asset are reviewed at each annual reporting period if there are indicators present that there has been a significant change from the previous estimate.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in profit or loss in the period.

1.3 Financial Instruments

Initial measurement

Financial instruments are initially measured at the transaction price. This includes transaction costs, except for financial instruments which are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Accounting Policies

1.3 Financial instruments (continued)

Financial instruments at amortised cost

Debt instruments, as defined in the standard, are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments which are classified as current assets or current liabilities are measured at the undiscounted amount of the cash expected to be received or paid, unless the arrangement effectively constitutes a financing transaction.

At the end of each reporting date, the carrying amounts of assets held in this category are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence of impairment. If so, an impairment loss is recognised

Financial instruments at cost

Commitments to receive a loan are measured at cost less impairment.

Equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably are measured at cost less impairment. This includes equity instruments held in unlisted investments.

Financial instruments at fair value

All other financial instruments are measured at fair value through profit and loss.

1.4 Impairment of assets

The company assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired.

If there is any indication that an asset may be impaired, the recoverable amount is estimated for the individual asset. If it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs is determined.

If an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or group of related assets) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but not in excess of the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or group of assets) in prior years. A reversal of impairment is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

1.5 Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

The cost of short-term employee benefits, (those payable within 12 months after the service is rendered, such as paid vacation leave and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits such as medical care), are recognised in the period in which the service is rendered and are not discounted.

1.6 Government grants

Grants that do not impose specified future performance conditions are recognised in income when the grant proceeds are receivable.

Grants that impose specified future performance conditions are recognised in income only when the performance conditions are met.

Grants received before the revenue recognition criteria are satisfied are recognised as a liability.

Grants are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable.

1.7 Revenue

When the outcome of a transaction involving the rendering of services can be estimated reliably, revenue associated with the transaction is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period. The outcome of a transaction can be estimated reliably when all the following conditions are satisfied:

- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;

Accounting Policies

1.7 Revenue (continued)

- It is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the company;
- the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period can be measured reliably; and
- the costs incurred for the transaction and the costs to complete the transaction can be measured reliably.

When the outcome of the transaction involving the rendering of services cannot be estimated reliably, revenue shall be recognised only to the extent of the expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents the amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of trade discounts and volume rebates, and value added tax.

Interest is recognised, in profit or loss, using the effective interest rate method.

1.8 Borrowing costs

*SARF together with 3M South Africa and Mogale City successfully submitted a bid to receive funding from the GRSP Botnar Child Road Safety Challenge Foundation to address Road Safety Challenges at schools in Mogale City, an additional amount of +/-32 000 Swiss Francs has been awarded to SARF as the consortium leader to addresses Child related Road Safety issues at three additional schools (**Diphalane and Phatudi Primary schools and Boipelo Intermediate school**) in Mogale City.*

SARF has completed the upgrading the Infrastructure at 6 Primary Schools in Kagiso township and two schools in the Munsieville township; pavements around the schools are been built so

that learners can walk safely to school i.e. off the roads where previously they had to share the road with motor vehicles. Special School Zone signs are been erected at the beginning and end of these school areas. New traffic signs have been erected and the road markings around the schools are been repainted. Raised pedestrian crossings have been built at a number of schools. Road Safety education programme will be rolled out to the Mogale City schools together with the Gauteng Department of Education and the Mogale City Traffic Department, once the Lockdown restrictions at the schools have been lifted.

C3 Public education for road users and NMT

A revised virtual Non-Motorised Transport Practitioners course was developed by Dr Ribbens and Andrew Wheeldon and was presented from 18 to 20 August and 11 to 13 November 2020.

Chairman's Report to Council

70th National AGM

26th November 2020

Corporate matters

Regional Committee

Firstly I would like to express my sincere gratitude to Piet Myburgh for many years of loyalty, guidance and perseverance in his role as Regional Coordinator. Piet decided to retire from the role at the end of July 2020 and his mentorship and leadership responsibilities will be missed.

After a process of interviews of eligible candidates, the Regional Committee appointed John Onraet as Piet's successor. John commenced his duties as Regional Coordinator on the 01st October.

I should like to thank all the committee members for their commitments to the affairs of the region during the past year. In particular I should like to thank our secretary, Elizma Moll, for her untiring efforts to support the proceedings of the meetings as well as making the arrangements for the virtual meetings held due to the global pandemic.

During the year we welcomed onto the committee Maxine Bezuidenhout from the City of Cape Town Traffic Department, and Lee-Ann Roos from Enis Flint.

Sadly, one of our stalwart contributing committee members, Kobus Van Der Walt from Sanral, will be retiring at the end of 2020. We thank him for such strong support of the SARF cause and will arrange an acknowledgement event when the moment is appropriate.

In keeping with SARF protocol, steps were taken to receive nominations for the incoming committee and office bearers for the period 2020 / 21. I am pleased to advise that all current members agreed en-bloc to continue serving for another year. We are pleased to have an additional nomination, Mr Gordon Roberston, who has made himself available.

Stakeholder engagement

Regional AGM and Members' Forum

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, a physical gathering of interested industry people has become impossible to arrange for our annual event. However, a virtual event took place after the AGM on 05th November 2020. There were 70 attendees.

Two presentations were delivered immediately after the Annual General Meeting:

Dr Matthew Townshend

In collaboration with Professor Don Ross, Dr Townshend from the UCT Graduate School of Business, presented their road investment prioritisation model which offers principled advice to optimally allocate any given budget in a way that conforms to the roads sector mandate.

Mr Bongani Dlamini

Mr Bongani Dlamini, a professional engineer with the Western Cape Government, presented details on the Safety Improvements to the R44 between Somerset West and Stellenbosch. This upgrade will provide innovative access management solutions and other enhancements, and was estimated at R200 million in the initial planning stage.

Connecting With Regional Membership

With the complex Covid emergency situation, special attention has been given to the regional membership database, where efforts have been made to identify the correct people in the local member companies. The end result is an up-to-date list of people with whom the sub-committee can now meaningfully engage.

A request has been made to Head Office to send relevant marketing information, the purpose of which is to use this material to communicate with potential new members. This should include the benefits of free attendance of the RPF, the generous discounts offered to member companies in respect of course attendance, and the BBBEE Level 1 status and the consequent procurement advantages.

SARF President's annual award

A nomination for a candidate was submitted head office.

Key issues in the road sector

The committee noted with concern that the uncertain state of the industry continues to deteriorate, especially with the Covid-19 emergency demanding funding which could have been allocated to our industry.

Our local Client bodies have all been negatively affected by the pandemic, some more than others.

It is pleasing to note, however, that the Western Cape Government is continuing to provide roadworks in the region, with some very large projects in the offing.

Sanral and the City of Cape Town are trying their very best to put out tenders and are acutely aware of the importance of capital and maintenance infrastructure spend.

SARF is one of six sponsors of the Road Pavement Forum and two sessions were held since the lockdown started, both highly successful. Our regional committee member, Kobus Van Der Walt delivered a presentation on the new COTO specification documents.

Safety in road usage

Junior Traffic Centre

Any significant progress on the establishment / completion of this centre, was severely curtailed by the Covid-19 situation. Efforts are still being made, where possible, to continue with the project and we are pleased that we still have full commitment from the City of Cape Town and our working committees.

Road safety audits

The lock-down has imposed operational constraints regarding road safety audits, especially with respect to site visits, as some staff were not yet able to travel. The use of drones to perform site visit inspections was considered, but if the drone inspections were part of a service being provided, i.e. a commercial activity, rules were more onerous. The committee felt that while the use of drone technology was adequate for site inspections, it was not suitable for the actual audits.

There has been much interaction with ECSA in this regard and this committee continues to provide input thereto.

Safety On Construction Sites

The planned roll-out of the Sabita "Work Zone Safety" training programme was put on hold due to Covid-19. When the emergency procedures have been lifted, and at an appropriate time, the national road safety committee would be apprised of the available package, to consider strategies for a national roll-out of the programme.

The regional safety committee will also investigate how this package could be applied on a regional basis in conjunction with Sabita and SAFCEC.

Road safety in the vicinity of schools

The use and application of the iRAP mobile app for rating schools in term of the safety of learners on roads in the immediate vicinity of schools still under consideration.

Road provision and delivery

The committee was kept abreast of concerns by the contracting and consulting professions regarding the hiatus in letting of major road contracts and its adverse effect on the state of the roads industry. These concerns were communicated on a regular basis to Council in an effort to give national impetus to addressing the problem.

Capacity development in the road sector

Seminars

The Members' Forum took place on 05th November as mentioned with two presentations, one on a financial topic and the second on an upcoming Provincial contract.

It is envisioned that in the coming year more focus and attention will be given to this agenda item.

Annual Report of the Education Committee

As Chairperson of the Education Committee, it is my privilege to report on the activities of the committee during the past year.

The committee met on five occasions during the year, one physical meeting in January and four conference call meetings during the period May to October.

2020 Courses

During the period from end-January to mid-March, 7 courses were presented at 9 venues with a total of 235 delegates. All courses were put on hold at the end of March because of the Covid-19 pandemic and the lockdown restrictions; plans were subsequently initiated to present some of the courses virtually. At the committee meeting held on 12 May, it was agreed that a concerted effort was required to completely reengineer the format of the courses in order to continue with SARF's aim of ongoing capacity building in the roads sector as well as to generate sufficient funds in order to get as close to the 2020 budget as possible. Presenters were approached to see who would be prepared to present their courses in a virtual format. Initially eight presenters indicated that they were willing to present their courses in the new format. As a result of a highly commendable effort by the SARF Head Office staff and significant co-operation of the course presenters, 37 virtual courses involving just short of 1 000 delegates were presented from June to the end of November. At the committee meeting held on 23 June, a significant amount of time was spent developing plans to market the new virtual courses.

In summary, 27 physical and virtual courses were presented (at 49 venues altogether) with a total of 1226 delegates. Only four in-house courses were held during 2020 (compared with 20 in 2019), primarily due to the Covid-19 pandemic and the flexibility of the virtual courses.

Three new courses were presented during 2020 as follows:

- The New COTO Specifications: Materials & Construction of Earthworks and Pavement Layers
(presented by R Koen)

- Practical User Guide for the design of Asphalt Mixes (SABITA Manual 24) (presented by *Joanne Muller & Christie Botha*)
- Urban drainage (on-line course) (*prepared by Marco van Dijk*)

The Urban Drainage course is the first online course presented by SARF, where delegates can complete the course in their own time. A total of 54 delegates completed the course during 2020.

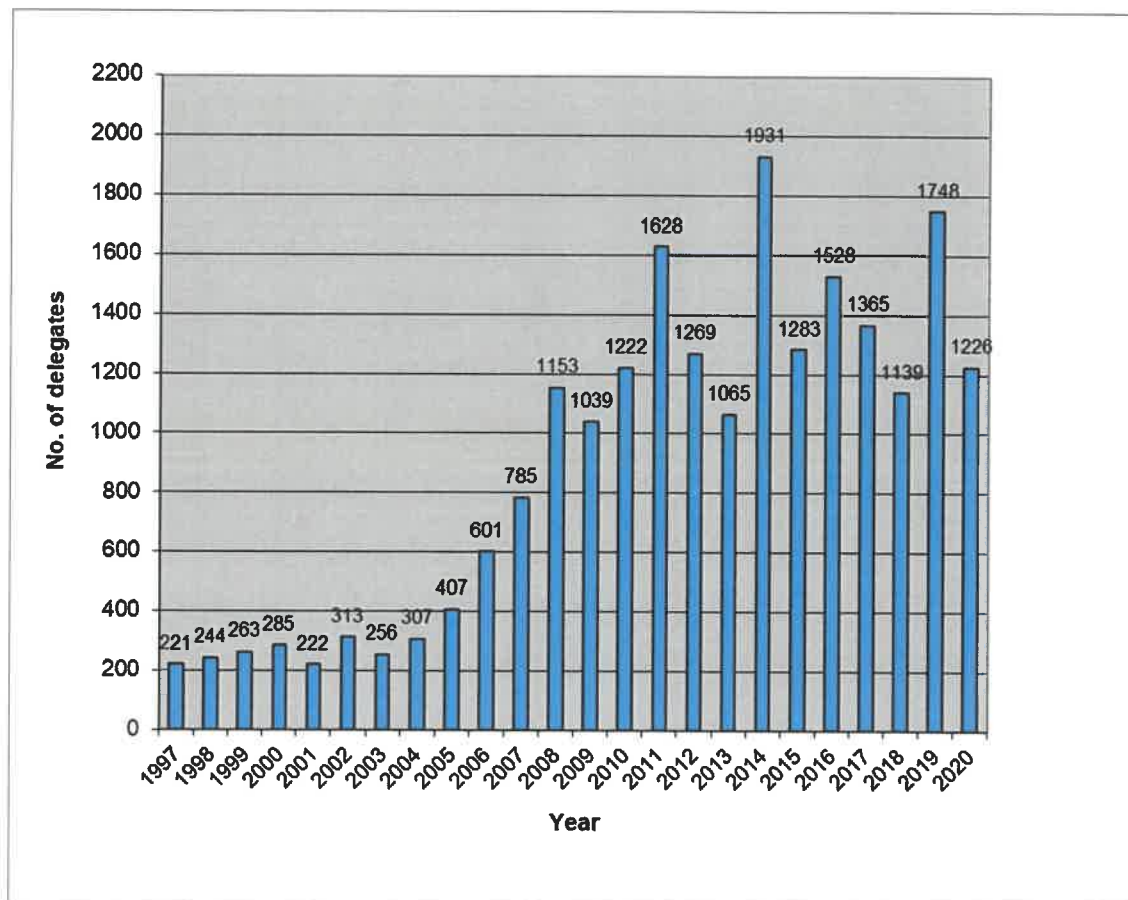
SARF participated as a Partner (sponsor) in one Brake & Tyre Watch training event during 2020 – on 19 & 20 Feb at the Omaramba Conference Centre (near Buffelspoort) and the Bapong weighbridge on the N4 in North West province. Approximately 80 traffic officers attended. The remainder of the Brake & Tyre Watch events for 2020 were cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Table 1 shows a history of the number of courses held, venues and delegates since 1997. During 2020, the average number of delegates for both the physical and virtual courses was 25, the same number as in 2019 and the highest since 2014. The total number of delegates (including current registrations for upcoming courses in Nov and early Dec) was 1226, which, although approximately 500 less than 2019, is an excellent achievement considering the significant challenges facing the organisers and presenters this year.

MoU's with other organisations

During 2015 SARF signed a Memorandum of Understanding with SAICE regarding the joint presentation of 8 SARF courses. It is believed that this will increase the exposure of the SARF courses to the roads industry, particularly the private sector, resulting in increased course attendance. The committee is continuing to monitor the attendance of these courses compared with previous years.

Discussions have been held with the City of Cape Town with regards a 3-year commitment to selected SARF courses. If approved, an MoU will be drawn up. Gauteng Department of Roads and Transport has also indicated an interest in such an MoU.

CPD Validation

As a Voluntary Association (VA) with ECSA (since 2011), SARF manages the validation of all their courses. This saves the organization approximately R 100 000 per annum. All courses are CPD validated.

SARF a Voluntary Association of the SACPCMP

During 2015 SARF registered as a Voluntary Association with the South African Council for Project and Construction Management Professions. The SACPCMP CPD Committee has accredited 17 SARF courses to date.

Courses planned for 2021

The first draft of the course planner for 2021 will be compiled by the end of the November and circulated to presenters and Regions for their input.

Grants

SARF awards grants to suitable applicants for full-time and part-time post-graduate and undergraduate studies at Universities and Universities of Technology in the areas of Road Transport Engineering, Transport Management and Transport Economics. Grant applications are accepted at any time during the year.

The grant committee met during January to evaluate applications for 2020. Nineteen grants were awarded. The total amount paid was R226 200.

3. SAFETY IN ROAD PROVISION AND USE

Regulations, Specifications, Statutory Requirements and Standards

The RTMC are involved in the following projects:

- The Road Restraint Systems Literature Review and Design Guideline/Methodology for SA. SANRAL are assisting with the project.
- A Literature Review and Update of the SA Road Safety Audit Manual.
- A Traffic Injury Study (MAIS3+) Mass Abbreviation Scale.
- A Traffic Offence Survey Literature Review and to Update the 2013 Methodology.
- A Crash Data Management Methodology is being developed internally at the RTMC.
- It is envisaged that the 1999 Road Safety Manual will be updated commencing in April 2021.
- The Cost of Crashes last published in 2016 based on 2015 data will be updated in 2022.
- The RTMC have created a Research and Engineering Division.
- A Draft Outdoor Advertising Manual Literature Review and Draft Chapter 22 of SARTSM Volume 2 and legal guidance for illegal outdoor advertising were completed during March 2020.

COTO Documents

The COTO Document has finally been approved and implementation must take place by March 2021.

SARF have been given the go ahead to arrange courses on the various Chapters by SANRAL. A course on Chapters 4 & 5 will be presented on the 5th and 6th of November 2020 and other chapters will be done during 2021. Presenters are being approached and finalized.

Revised Chapter 13 of the SARTSM

There is still no finality on when Volume 2 of Chapter 13 of the SARTSM will be approved.

Geometric Design Guide

A DoT Geometric Design Guideline review Committee has been set up and the ToR's are nearly finalized. The SARF RSC has been requested for comments and input.

Botnar Schools Project – Mogale City

Work has commenced on the final school in Kagiso. However, there have been delays due to Community Engagement issues. Mogale City's Traffic Department is once again operational and the installation of road traffic signs and road markings will be done. The whole project should be completed by the end of November. Equipment to assist in training learners will be donated by 3M and from funds left over from the Botnar Foundation. A video will be put together to share the success of the project.

SARF will continue trying to source funding from Europe and the USA for similar projects in other Provinces.

Vision Zero for Africa Virtual Road Safety Conference 1 - 3 December 2020

3 members of the SARF RSC (Iris Wink, Siegfried Grosskopf, and Verushka Balam) will be doing presentations at this virtual conference and 2 moderators (Basil Jonsson, Ivandra Udoyen)

4. CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT IN THE ROAD SECTOR

Engineering For Road Safety Forum

It is envisaged that this Forum will be launched at the SATC during 2021. SARF have been allocated a half day by the SATC for presentations. More time could be added depending on how many papers or presentations SARF will receive.

Safe Systems Approach Webinar – 26th August 2020

This Webinar put together by Kobus Labuschagne and others was a huge success. All presenters, both international and local, delivered excellent presentations and many accolades have been received. 218 delegates from around the country and further afield registered to attend but only 149 logged in. 50 followed it on YouTube video after the event.

Road Safety Audits

SARF and the RTMC put together a draft process document which outlines the requirements to register Road Safety Auditors under the Engineering Council of South Africa. This document was sent to ECSA for evaluation and comment. Feedback is awaited on the outcome.

The Road Safety Audit Courses, that were able to be held this past year, have been well attended.

Demonstration Projects

Slow progress has been made with the K69 Project due to working under capacity. Province has said or done nothing with the Road Safety Audit that SARF performed.

Legal Obligations of the OHS Act and Roadwork's Traffic Management Webinar

Plans are being put in place to organize this webinar for late January 2021.

Brake and Tyre Watch

Brake and Tyre Watch sponsorship has been withdrawn, but could be reviewed when SARF's financials improve.
